Founded in 1893 by brothers Joseph and Anton Hemmerle, the family specialised in crafting medals and royal orders for the Bavarian royal family.

In 1995, Joseph's grandson Stefan and his wife Sylveli took over and transformed it into the innovative institution it is today.

"My father-in-law is someone who's attracted to so many things, even a paperclip," says Yasmine. "I remember that I went to a gem show with the family around the time I first started working with them, and asked then, what I should be looking out for. Their answer surprised me—'We will look, and we will let our inspiration be guided by what we find." The couple began working with iron and brass, which were unusual materials to choose in their line of business.

Most recently the team has started to anodise aluminium (an electrochemical process that converts the metal surface into a colourful finish). "Once you start experimenting, it is difficult to stop," adds Christian, who also dabbles with copper, stainless steel, brass, and silver that he mixes with extraordinary gemstones.

"The gemstone drives the inspiration. You shouldn't try to squeeze gems into design, it should be the other way around," adds Yasmine. And the Hemmerles continue to do just that, continuously challenging conventions with their inimitable sense of design and wit. ■
